




1689, Founding of the Domaine by Pierre de Mazure de Rauzan

- Her daughter, Thérèse, received this estate as a dowry when marrying Jacques de Pichon Longueville, 1st President of the Bordeaux Parliament
- One single family for more than 250 years

From 1779 to 1850, The Baron Joseph de Pichon Longueville

- In 1850, he chose to divide the property between its five children
- The Château is ranked as a Second Classified Growth in the 1855 Classification drawn up by Napoelon IIIrd





1850 - 1882 VIRGINIE DE PICHON LONGUEVILLE, COMTESSE DE LALANDE

- One of the most illustrious Médoc characters of the 19th century
- She gave its independance to Pichon Comtesse with the construction of the Château, the vat room and cellars




1925, the Miailhe family

- > Consequently to the Great War, many vineyards were put up for auction
- > Edouard and Louis Miailhe, descendants from ancient family of Bordeaux acquired the Château

1978, May Eliane de Lencquesaing

- One of the most enthusiastic and charismatic Bordeaux wine ambassadors
- Under her management, Pichon Comtesse gained a worldwide reputation



2007 THE LOUIS ROEDERER FAMILY

- Frédéric Rouzaud, 7th Generation at the helm of the Champagne Louis Roederer House
- Only the third family to preside over the destiny of Pichon Comtesse in more than 300 years of history

OUR UNIQUE TERROIR

- Around 70 plots surrounding the Château, close to the Gironde river.
- Ideally located between the Gironde Estuary and the Atlantic Ocean, two components of our microclimate:
 - > Favouring air movements
 - Restraining temperature excess
 - Creating the optimum ripening conditions
- Poor, low-yielding soils with gentle slopes made up of gravel on clay subsoils
 - Enabling excellent drainage of the rainwater

A NEW ERA FOR PICHON COMTESSE

- Since 2009, important restructuration of the vineyards...
 - To favour a better match between grape varieties, rootstocks and soils
- And development of a taylor-made viticulture...
 - Cultivation of soils, no herbicides
 - > A new pruning method to increase vines lifespan
 - « Massal » selection to preserve ancient plant material
 - Biodynamic viticulture applied on 15 hectares (3 more hectares every year)

A NEW VAT ROOM

Built in September 2013, it is made of natural materials (glass, wood, steel)

MAJOR IMPROVEMENTS FOR BETTER VINIFICATIONS

- > A « Parcellaire » approach
- > Vats filled up by gravity
- ➤ Soft extractions with new conical stainless-steel vats

- the same terroir as the Grand Vin.
- New label and name starting from 2017 vintage.
- Plots selection determined in January, during the blending session
- Aged in French oak barrels for 12 months with 40% of new oak.
